

SPD makes quick arrest in Bank Plus robbery

SLIDELL - Slidell Police took less than 24 hours to make an arrest in a lunchtime bank heist that occurred last Thursday, Nov. 2, on Gause Boule-

SPD Spokesman Det. Daniel Seuzeneau reported that around 11:30 a.m., Slidell Police responded to Bank Plus (1936 Gause Boulevard E.) in reference to an armed robbery. The suspect entered the bank, wielded a pistol and demanded money, then after obtaining an undisclosed amount of cash, fled the area in an unknown direction.

By utilizing a wide range of surveillance videos from around the area, as well as other investigative tools, investigators were able to track down the bank robber in less than 24 hours. The suspect was identified as 49year-old Herbert Earl Davis of Slidell, who resided at an address on Markham Drive in Slidell.

Davis, who is a convicted felon and

had an extensive violent criminal history, was taken into custody on Friday during a traffic stop. Davis initially tried to elude officers by driving recklessly through a neighborhood but was quickly located and apprehended.


